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

On Art, Pedagogy, and Liberation: Pursuing Passion, Purpose, and Possibility*

- Keynote Speaker: Dr. Christopher Emdin
- In this address, Dr. Christopher Emdin highlights the present state of education and pushes us to imagine and then move towards a pedagogy that offers new possibilities. In an equal parts philosophical and practical talk, he merges theory and practice to move educators to examine where our passions lie, what our purpose should be, and what a system that uses the arts as a vehicle for transformation could look like.



Christopher Emdin is a tenured professor in the Department of Mathematics, Science, and Technology at Teachers College, Columbia University, where he also serves as Associate Director of the Institute for Urban and Minority Education. He is the author of the award-winning book Urban Science Education for the Hip-Hop Generation and the New York Times Best Seller, For White Folks Who Teach In The Hood and the Rest of Y'all Too. Emdin has been named one of the The Root 100 Most Influential African Americans and one of the 27 people bridging divides across America by Times magazine. His newest books Ratchetdemic and STEM, STEAM, MAKE, DREAM will be released in 2021.

- Poetry as Activism is an introduction to the art and techniques of activist poetry. Participants experience a process that takes them from exploring a social issue they care about, to writing and performing a creative work inspired by that issue. Writing techniques, literary devices, and historical events will illuminate opportunities for participants to connect to their own lived experiences and passion. This creative process can be used by participants to help them better understand the social issues impacting people of other identities around them. SEL core competencies of perspective taking, empathy, respecting diversity, understanding societal norms and recognizing community supports will be central to the creative process, while also laying foundations for responsible decision making and relationship skills.

Art for Art's Sake: Touch for Joy's Sake

- Anna Gichan has been thinking a lot about contact and qualities of touch. Between the pandemic, existing virtually, and all the empty studio spaces in our community, so many of us are hungry for connection. Contact improvisation is a vessel for understanding various qualities of touch, intentions, weight, and effort without fear. In Anna's tiny room, she's been playing with connecting to the wall, the floor, pushing into it, leaning into it, supporting myself from different body parts, and the speeds at which she can switch the body part support centers. Participants will explore individual relationships to the elements of movement through touch and creative play and find ways to connect these explorations to your own art form. We'll discover new ways of connecting with yourself and your space. All that's needed is a wall, a floor, and a mind open for bodily exploration.

Art for Art's Sake: Chinese Dragon Shadow Puppet Theater

- Participants are introduced to the history and culture of traditional Chinese shadow puppet theater and learn about characteristics of the mythological Chinese dragon. After a trip through the unique world of the artist's studio, participants are guided in making their own dragon shadow puppet and shown how to create a shadow puppet show at home using a flashlight or cell phone and their imaginations to tell their own original stories. The workshop is also interactive, with real-time feedback from the artist and a question-and-answer period at the end.
- Materials needed: 1 sheet of bright color card-stock, size 8"x11" or cereal-box or cardboard instead, 2 flexible straws or 2 chopsticks, 3 brass fasteners size 3/4" or 1 needle and thread, 1 hole punch (if use Brass fasteners), 1 scissor, 1 glue stick, colored markers, masking tape, small LED flashlight or flashlight on cell phone

Having been dubbed "an amazing ride" by the New York Times, this mind boggling performance has been described as "The Simpsons meets Malcolm X at a Notorious B.I.G. concert."



These theatre-trained, comedically-gifted, lyrical virtuosos seamlessly blend raw elements of hip hop, theatre, improv, and stand-up comedy to tell gut-wrenching truths that leave audiences forever changed.

The Mayhem Poets' unique approach to spoken word has landed them feature spots on The Today Show and Eyewitness News, after winning 1st place and a grant for 100K in the Microsoft Idea Wins Challenge in 2006. Since then they've been touring internationally from legendary venues like Lincoln Center, the Apollo Theatre, and Broadway's New Victory Theatre; to hundreds of universities, local schools of all grades, as well as group homes and correctional facilities.




